The Carrington family bought New Plymouth's historic Burgess House from the New Plymouth District Council in August last

On the weekend the building was shifted from its Junction Rd (State Highway 3) site to a new spot behind Paritutu Bowling Club.

Gifted to the city in 1936 along with five hectares of grounds, the building's future was uncertain for the perfect location. since its commercial tenant moved out in July 2011.

The council put the house up for tender last year rather than pay for a \$700,000 upgrade that was

deemed necessary to secure a new commercial tenant.
