Historic house DN in demand at auction



AN OUTSTANDING historic house, Plas Mawr, designed and built by Chapman Taylor, attracted spirited bidding on Saturday morning and was eventually sold for \$279,000 to a New Plymouth buyer.

"It is the only one of its kind in New Plymouth and that's why it attracted over 100 people to the auction," said Real Estate agent Max Murrow, of Harcourts.

Mr Murrow said the Standish St property's new owner was an unsuccessful bidder 15 years ago and this time was determined to buy it.

The house was built in 1913 for £1000 and is one of 80

Chapman Taylor houses in New Zealand.


The property, which has an Historic Places Trust Category 1 rating, attracted interest from bidders as far away as Auckland and Wellington.

"It is one of his better designs because he used slate on the roof instead of tiles. The spouting is copper. In the kitchen the marble is an inch thick, the windows are made

out of Australian jarrah, which is expected to last between 400-500 years," said Mr Murrow.

The 190m² house even has its own air conditioning - a series of concrete tunnels that circulate air through the house.

Mr Murrow said the Chapman Taylor interpretation of the name was My Place, but several Welsh people had told him Plas Mawr meant My Palace.

He designed and built about 80 houses throughout New Zealand, most of them in the Wellington and Heretaunga areas.
