Dr Fookes attended New Plymouth Boys' High School where he was head boy and captain of the First Fifteen and First Eleven. He set a record at the school when he took 8 wickets for 10 runs during a match against Wanganui Collegiate. He was also a good athlete and won the school's senior championship. Dr Fookes married Miss Catherine Moyes, daughter of the late Mr W. H. Moyes, a former headmaster of the high school.
